Highlights from the National UCW Annual Meeting, September 18 to 22, 2023

On Monday, September 18, 2023, UCW women from across Canada arrived at Queen of the Apostles Renewal Centre in Mississauga, Ontario, for the National UCW (NUCW) meeting. Each Regional UCW was represented by two women. We were about to embark on a busy time of learning, discussion, worship, and fellowship.

President Nancy Risto's theme for her term was, "Where There's Faith, There's Hope", with the scripture Jeremiah 29: 11, "For surely I know the plans I have for you", says the Lord, "to give you a future with hope".

President Barbara Davison's theme is "Lead not only by word, but by action". Scriptures: from Nehemiah 2: 20, "The God of heaven will help us succeed. We, his servants, will start rebuilding this wall" and also 1 Corinthians 12: 12 - 27, One body with many members.

We gathered with singing before each session, and had morning worship and vespers each day, led by women from different regions. Each day included business meetings, guest speakers, and time with our friends from across the country.

NUCW Business

Reports were received from our President, Regional Presidents, and others. President Nancy Risto announced that the celebration of the 65th anniversary of UCW will be held in Ottawa, July 19 to 23, 2027. Win Czum, our representative on the Women's Interchurch Council, reminded us about the 2024 World Day of Prayer service, written by Christian women in Palestine, and to wear black on Thursdays to promote the end of gender-based violence. From Angie Musonza, Church in Mission, we learned that the General Council offices will be moving to 300 Bloor Street in 2025.

In other business, Karen Gardner is retiring as our national secretary. The new secretary is Cheryl Sullivan. We are looking for a Communications Lead for "Keeping in Touch" and other media work. (Further



information in this issue of Keeping in Touch). Carolle Dallas-Arbuckle was elected to another two-year term as our national treasurer. NUCW members volunteered to serve on NUCW committees.

On Thursday, Carolle presented the budget for the coming year, which was passed with a few amendments. Canadian Shield expressed concern that the UCW Handbook does not include procedures to follow in closing a Regional UCW. Appendix 4 will be revised to include this possibility. Carolle led us in a workshop on the future of UCW, and Nancy Risto led a workshop on having a national UCW space where women can meet virtually, even if their unit, area, or church closes.

Guest Speakers

On Tuesday, Joni Shawana, Coordinator of the Healing Fund, spoke to us about the fund, the varied projects it supports, and how projects are chosen. The Fund was established in 1994, and we made it our national UCW project last year. The first project to have funding from our UCW contributions to the Fund is the Regina Native Outreach Ministry's Welcome Bags. These bags contain essentials for new moms and babies, and were assembled, blessed, and given to native women giving birth at the Regina General Hospital. Please continue to donate to the Healing Fund by sending a cheque to the United Church of Canada, with NUCW – Healing Fund in the memo line.

Also on Tuesday, Amy Crawford led us in a Bible Study on Jeremiah 29: 11, and Lori Neale, from Church in Mission, spoke to us about love of creation and care for the environment. Check out the website "fortheloveofcreation.ca", an ecumenical initiative to which the United Church belongs.

Tuesday evening, our guest speaker was Rev. Alison Mock, speaking on "Experiencing Joy". Rev. Mock is a UCC minister, now working as a funeral director. She spoke about how people feel they have to be sad when preparing for a funeral, but said it is also good to have a laugh while remembering the good times. She attempted to show us the Pixar movie "Inside Out", which personifies the emotions within a young girl's head, but there were technical difficulties, so we saw only part of it. In the movie, Joy tries to prevent Sadness from playing a role in the girl's life, but it turns out that Sadness is important after all.

On Wednesday, our guests were our Moderator, the Right Reverend Carmen Lansdown (Kwisa'lakwa) and General Secretary Michael Blair. Michael expressed appreciation for the UCW and encouraged us to stay the course. Carmen spoke about the highlights of her year as Moderator, including a canoe trip with indigenous and nonindigenous youth, and a project where youth were hired for the summer to develop and work on environmental projects.

On Thursday, Lori-Anne Livingstone, UCC press and public relations lead, presented an excellent workshop on high impact communication. Her suggestions included: 1) know your audience; 2) be relevant and objective; and 3) be simple and succinct.

Guest speakers were thanked by Saskatchewan UCCW and presented with a blessing bag by Sharon Prenevoist of Chinook Winds.

Entertainment and Worship

Nancy Risto arranged for the Niagara Men's Chorus to present a concert for us in the chapel at the retreat house. It was enjoyed by all.

On Friday, we closed with a communion service led by Rev. Japhet Ndhlovu, and the installation of Barbara Davison as the new NUCW president. This service was available by Zoom.

Next annual meeting of the NUCW will be September 16-20, 2024, also at Queen of Apostles.

Frequently Asked Questions about World Day of Prayer Writing Committees (WDP 2024)

How is the writing committee chosen for World Day of Prayer? In August 2017, 188 delegates traveled from around the world to attend the World Day of Prayer International Meeting in Foz do Iguaçu, Brazil. These women came from Catholic, Protestant and Orthodox traditions to pray together, share their stories in community, and make decisions for the future of the movement. It was an executive committee of these delegates who selected the writer committee for 2024.

How is the theme chosen for World Day of Prayer? Every five years, the World Day of Prayer International conference is held. Each national committee is given the opportunity to submit a theme, along with a suitable Bible passage. During this international meeting, a committee considers the various suggestions for themes, and then chooses themes as well as writing regions for the next five years. Palestine was chosen to be the writing committee for 2024 and was given the theme on which to base the service.

What is the membership structure of the World Day of Prayer International Committee? The WDPIC constitution divides its membership by 7 regions in order not to be restricted by geo-political designations. "Regions" of the world are namely, Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, Middle East, Caribbean-North America and Pacific.

How should we receive the World Day of Prayer service written by the Palestine writing committee? Each year the WDP theme and the worship service developed by women of another region is a gift. Receiving it is a spiritual process. It needs time, open hearts and minds, careful listening and speaking, willingness to stretch beyond what is familiar. When we receive the liturgy in a local community, we begin by ensuring that there is an atmosphere that is spiritually open and non-judgmental. In this way we can listen to the voices of faraway women and to the biblical message they want to convey to us. In a climate of attentive listening, we will hear them speak about their hopes and fears, joys and sorrows, and at the same time we will listen to the women next to us and find our own response. We use silence to reflect and pray.

How do we respond when some people object to the writing committee region? In 1994 when Palestine was the writing committee for the World Day of Prayer service, Eileen King, then executive director of the International Committee for the World Day of Prayer, reminded participants that the 1994 service was to be understood as one written by Palestinian Christian women, not a Palestinian service. Let us, then, look now for commonalities and avoid polarization. Let us be an example of women working well together with



as purpose to build relationships with women in other regions of the world, and grow and deepen our understanding, in part, by reading our Palestine background information. As the service theme suggests, I beg you ... bear with one another in love.

Are World Day of Prayer donations given to the writing committee region? No, donations in Canada support future World Day of Prayer services as well as grants provided in Canada and internationally. World Day of Prayer grant applications are received via wicc.org and carefully assessed.

What is the meaning behind the symbol for World Day of Prayer? The symbol for World Day of Prayer was developed by the women of Ireland and adopted as the international logo in 1982. Its design is made up of arrows converging from the four points of the compass, people kneeling in prayer, the cross, and the circle, representing the world and our unity through all our diversity.

The Healing Fund - update

A thank you to all who have donated to The Healing Fund. Since this project began in September of 2022, to the end of December 13, 2023, UCW women have donated \$22,926.97. The first project that was selected by The Healing Fund Working Group was the Regina Native Outreach Ministry, Mother & Baby Welcome Bags for Indigenous New Moms at the Regina General Hospital. Many of the new mothers do not have these essential items to care for their newborn and themselves. The Welcome Bags provide a tangible and loving start to breaking the cycles of shame passed down from residential schools. Items included in the Welcome Bags: diapers size 1, diaper cream, handknit baby blanket, onesies size 0-3 months, sleepers' size 0-3 months, burp clothes, bibs, baby soap, baby shampoo, baby wipes, nursing pads, menstrual pads heavy flow, small gift for mom such as hand lotion, lip balm, candle. Appendix 5: Policy and Procedures regarding the Election of the National President

The National President-Elect is elected every two years.

National President-Elect Requirements

- 1 Have held, or holding, the position of United Church Women Region/District or former Conference/District President.
- 2 Candidates must be nominated by her Region/District or two members of the current National United Church Women Executive.
- 3 Nominations for National President-Elect, with a short bio, must be received by the National United Church Women's secretary no later than June 15th of the election year for National President-Elect. If the nomination papers are delivered by Canada Post, or any other delivery service, it must be postmarked no later than June 15th.
- 4 At the close of nominations, the National United Church Women's secretary will circulate the names of the nominated candidates to the Region/Districts and the National United Church Women Executive along with the short bio provided by the candidates no later than June 30th.
- 5 Nominated candidates will be given the opportunity to provide a campaign video, written material, attend the annual meeting of the National United Church Women Executive via Zoom or other media streams available on the scheduled day for the election.
- 6 If no nominations are received by June 15th, then the National United Church Women will open nominations at their annual meeting where nominations will be entertained providing candidates are nominated by two voting members of the National United Church Women. *Nominated candidates must meet the first requirement.*
- 7 The position of the National President-Elect is the start of a four-year term commitment.

One year as National President- Elect, two years as President, one year as Past President

Hi everyone,

If your Community of Faith, wishes to make a donation, the best way to get the funds to where it needs to go is to make the cheque payable to your Area or Region. Make sure you put in the memo line of the cheque what it is for. Example: UCW dues, The Healing Fund, Mission & Service. If the cheque is covering a number of different things, you can send a paper with the breakdown of the amount.

Your Area or Regional treasurer also can send just one cheque to the National UCW with a paper outlining how the amount is divided.

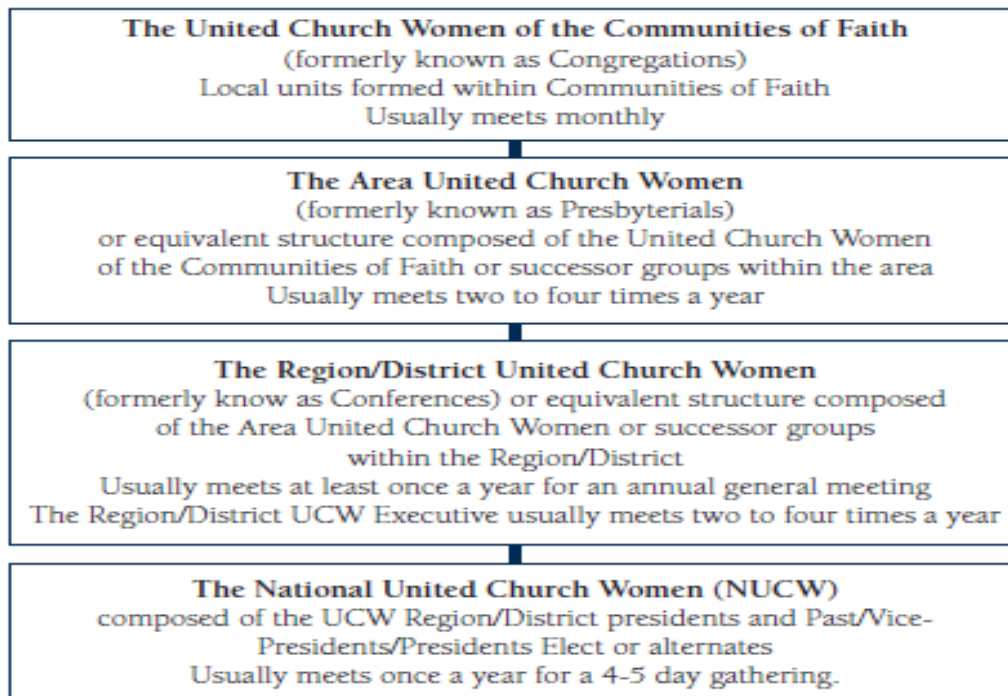

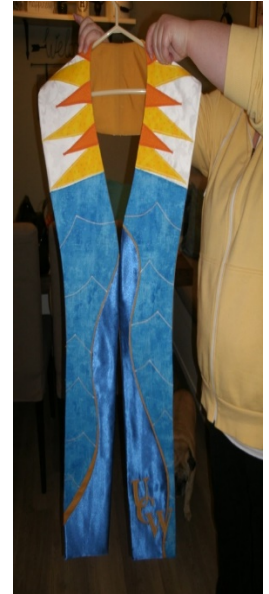
Shining Waters Region UCW Report
