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


Still True for 2021

Getting Started

Using the Program Guide

Start here for an inspiring overview of the program (youtu.be/X8VXXVoWuBc). The Program Guide, together with the Quick Start Guide Video, Planning Workbook, Worship Sampler, and united-church.ca/stewardship, will help you plan and coordinate your giving program.

The **Program Guide** includes: agendas for Giving Team meetings, a workshop on gathering Why I Give stories, guidelines for formulating a Narrative Budget, and support for creating invitations to a Community Meal(s) and a Letter of Invitation. There are also other resources such as Stewardship Prayers. Finally, the **Program Guide** has a section on Wrap-Up and Evaluation.

The **Planning Workbook** complements the **Program Guide** with resources to help keep you on track: setting goals, mapping out the tasks for the giving program you choose, and evaluating the program for the future. It will come in handy if a key team member drops out and will give you a head start for your next giving program.

Worship Sampler – We have worship, sermons, and children's programs for key seasons of the liturgical year. The **Worship Sampler**, which includes Week 1 from each of the worship programs, will help you choose a time and a program that fits your faith community. The programs are:

Gather Your Giving Team

Your first step is to gather a small and dedicated team to plan and run the program—even if that team is just you! Your team may be led by laypeople or a combination of ministry personnel and laypeople. Ideally, have two people co-lead the team to support each other and increase accountability. The team will

- coordinate the program, acting as its visible leaders
- invite people to give, to support the ministry in your community
- increase your community of faith's understanding of how giving is a spiritual practice and stewardship contributes to God's mission
- teach and encourage everyone to be faithful and generous stewards at all ages and stages of faith

What does the **Giving Team** look like? It should look like your congregation and include people who are

- younger and older
- representative of all genders
- long-time and new
- introverts and extroverts
- keen on the ministry of the congregation
- wise and respected in the community

Giving Team's First Meeting

At this first meeting (90 minutes to two hours) you will

- increase understanding of generosity and giving as a way of living our faith
- introduce this year's *Called to Be the Church* Congregational Giving Program—Discipleship Is Stewardship 2021
- introduce Why I Give stories and invite team members to develop their stories
- invite everyone to make a meaningful and intentional gift to the mission of your church and to complete a Response Card, returning it at the next meeting
- start setting goals and a timeline using the Planning Workbook
- plan communication with the congregation

You may want to move some of these tasks to Giving Team's Second Meeting, p. 13.

Every Giving Team member will commit to making a meaningful and intentional financial gift to support the ministry of the community and Mission & Service

Ahead of Time

- 1. Set up equipment to show video(s).
- 2. Create a Response Card for your program (sample p. 34). Have a return envelope for each Response Card.
- Decide if you are going to customize the following:



Introduce the Called to Be the Church Giving Program

Hand out copies of the Quick Start Guide and Planning Workbook.

Show the introduction video. The video puts the program in perspective and introduces the three pillars of the program—Inspire, Invite, Thank.

MIDDLE

Inspire—Introduce Why I Give Stories

Why I Give stories are personal testimonies and are an important element of the **Inspire** part of our giving program. We can all be inspired by one another when we share stories from the heart—in this case, exploring the basis of our faith and why each of us participates in and gives to God's mission.

These stories will also form part of the **Invite** practice of the giving program. Snippets can be included in a letter to members and shared at the Community Meal. When the Giving Team invites people to give to the mission of your church, sharing your *Why I Give* stories will be a key part of the invitation.

Show the Called to Be the Church: Quick Start Guide video at bit.ly/Q_S_G. Together, discuss the video and ask:

- What did you, as listeners, find compelling or want to know more about?
- How would the stories you heard help to invite others to join you in supporting our church's mission?

For a comprehensive workshop on gathering **Why I Give** stories, see pp. 18–20.

Then ask these questions to help each person find their story:

- What brought you into The United Church of Canada or to this congregation?
- Why do you stay?
- Share a memorable experience of either giving a gift or receiving a gift.
- Why do you give? (Why? Not how or what.)
- Why do you give to God's mission—in your congregation, your community, and through Mission & Service?

Your team may feel comfortable discussing the above questions together, or they might jot down ideas to think about after the meeting.

As a group, consider how to share your stories: with a friend; with a group in the congregation; in worship; by including stories in the bulletin.

Invite everyone to write out their story after the meeting. People might practise telling their stories to other Giving Team members in the coming days or at the Giving Team's Second Meeting (pp. 13–17). Do what you can to help one another improve your stories to give them more impact.

Invite—Giving Team Makes the First Gifts

Distribute Response Cards, return envelopes, and Proportional Giving Charts or Step Charts.

Invite all team members to join in supporting the mission of your congregation. Include your *Why I Give* story in your invitation to inspire them.

Explain that it is important for every member of this leadership team to have already considered what they will contribute. Request that everyone give the invitation prayerful consideration and determine an **intentional and meaningful gift**, fill in the Response Card, and return it in a sealed envelope to a designated person as soon as possible. The idea is for the Giving Team to indicate their support and model the process before inviting others in the community of faith to do the same.

You have just made your first invitation!

Key Decisions

As a group, review the purpose of your meetings:

- First meeting—set goals and a timeline for the program
- Second meeting—decide on how you will invite people (see p. 24)

These are critical decisions and may require more time to make sure the program will meet your goals.

Your invitation will be more successful if you help people feel that returning their Response Card is a way of including and honouring their gifts. By inviting everyone to return the card, regardless of how it is filled out, you show that you value their contribution. This may be a new practice for your community; it may help if you explain how the information will be helpful in determining whether goals are met and how the leadership can plan for future ministry.

Set Goals (Planning Workbook, pp. 5–8)

If you have a goal, you know what you are working toward and you will know whether you are successful.

A congregational giving program can have many different goals. Here are a few examples:

- generous donations
- increasing participation rates
- increasing donations received
- having more people join Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR)

Set a Timeline (Planning Workbook, pp. 9–14)

Keeping in mind the life of your community, determine which giving program will be best for you and the best time to launch it.

- Which is the best season in your community?
- Will the Sundays coincide with any important dates?
- Will your program be for five weeks, three weeks, or one Sunday? Will it be planned for consecutive weeks, once a month, or a different schedule?

END

Wrap-Up

Identify what needs to be accomplished immediately—who will do what and by when. Review what you will need at the Giving Team's Second Meeting and who will do what to prepare for it.

Set the next meeting date.

Giving Team's Second Meeting

The goals of this meeting are to

- share one or more Why I Give stories from team members
- introduce the concept of a Narrative Budget and begin creating one
- review and add to the plan and timeline for the program
- begin the practice of giving thanks—including handwritten thank-you notes—for the gifts already received (Encourage others on the team to submit their Response Cards as soon as possible.)
- take next steps to inform the congregation about the program (See Communication p. 36 in this Program Guide and pp. 18–19 in the Planning Workbook.)

Ahead of Time

- 1. Write a thank-you note to everyone who has returned their Response Card.
- 2. Set up equipment to show video(s).
- 3. Print out copies of a sample Narrative Budget (see p. 23 and united-church.ca/stewardship).
- 4. Have a calendar handy to plan the timeline.

BEGINNING

Welcome

Honour God with everything you own; give [God] the first and the best.

Thank people again for responding to the invitation to be part of this important venture. Practising gratitude is a foundation of this program; we can never thank enough.

Opening Prayer

Why I Give Stories

If possible, have one or more volunteers share their *Why I Give* story with the group. Encourage everyone to finish preparing their stories and practise sharing them in the coming days.

Giving Team's Gifts: Modelling Gratitude

This is an opportunity for the co-leaders to model gratitude for all the gifts that have been received. Express thanks and give each person a handwritten thank-you note for their contribution. This is the beginning of the Thanks pillar.

Encourage other team members to hand in their Response Cards as soon as possible.

MIDDLE

Key Decisions

- **1. Goals:** Referring to the *Planning Workbook*, review the goals established at the first meeting and refine goals as necessary.
- **2. Inspire:** There are two key tools to inspire generosity:
 - the Why I Give stories you have already worked on
 - the Narrative Budget or the story of the ministry of your congregation

These two tools form the centrepiece of the **Invite** phase of the program. Together, they will encourage generosity among your members.

Now that there are a few Why I Give stories in development, consider who else might be approached for their story. If there are a half dozen or so potential storytellers, consider hosting a workshop to assist people in honing their stories. Five reasons to invite every person

- 1. Models the regular and consistent spiritual practice of giving
- 2. Provides an opportunity to inform everyone about the ministry you undertake and how it changes lives
- 3. Provides an opportunity to listen to people in your community
- 4. Provides the basis for all other giving: legacy giving and major project giving
- 5. Models the regular and consistent spiritual practice of giving (yes, this is worth repeating!)

The best reason for **inviting everyone personally** is because it is the way Jesus did it. Jesus called individuals to follow his way of life:

As [Jesus] walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him.

Matthew 4:18-20

3. Invite: The best way to invite others to support the ministry of your congregation is for one person to tell another, face-to-face, why they support this ministry and to invite the other person to join them by making an intentional and meaningful gift. This is the tried and true method employed by other successful charitable organizations.

However, there is a more compelling precedent for us as people of faith: the individual invitation is how Jesus called people to follow his way of life and become disciples.

We know the main reason many people don't give is because they have not been asked. The United Church of Canada, like other mainline denominations, has largely abandoned the practice of annually inviting everyone in the community to pledge support of their mission by making an intentional and meaningful gift. Instead, we have turned to event-based fundraising. This type of fundraising has its place. Ideally, it supplements the generosity of members by building fellowship and encouraging people beyond the community of faith to support the church's work for justice.

It is time to return to the practice of inviting everyone in our faith community to contribute to our mission by using the two ways suggested by this giving program: Community Meal(s) (see Planning Workbook, pp. 15–16) and Letter of Invitation (Planning Workbook, p. 17).

Communication

Prepare to introduce the giving program to the congregation (see Planning Workbook, pp. 18–19, and Communication, p. 36 in this Program Guide).

You might plan to introduce the program at Sunday worship ahead of, or, in Program Week 1 (see Planning Workbook, p. 9), but whatever your timeline, it is wise to consider now how you will get the word out: spoken announcement, bulletin insert, e-mail, letter, or other communication tool.

Communicating with your community throughout the weeks of the program helps to create and maintain interest and excitement. See the chart on p. 18 of the Planning Workbook for some ideas.

END

Wrap-Up

- List the tasks for the coming weeks and dates. Decide who will do what.
- Identify what needs to be accomplished immediately—who will do what and when.
- Set the next meeting date. (The next meeting outline provided in this resource is for the Giving Team's Evaluation, p. 40. Other meetings may need to be called along the way to review progress.)

Resources

Inspire

Stories of *Why I Give* and a Narrative Budget form the centrepiece of the **Inspire** phase of the program. Together, they will encourage generosity among your members.

Why I Give—a Workshop for Gathering Stories (90 min.)

Ahead of Time

Invite a selection of members to develop their stories of why they support the mission of your congregation. You will need:

BEGINNING (15 min.)

Opening Prayer

Gracious and loving God,

you call us to be disciples of your son,

Jesus, and good stewards of your many gifts.

Introduction

Share the purpose of this gathering:

- to learn more about the congregational giving program
- to introduce the program theme (Discipleship Is Stewardship), the Giving Team, and the plans so far
- to create each individual's Why I Give story to share with others

MIDDLE (65 min.)

Why "Why I Give"? (5 min.)

Sharing Why I Give is an important element in the **Inspire** part of our giving program. We can all be inspired by one another when we share stories from the heart—in this case, exploring why each of us gives to God's mission.

Video (5 min.)

Introduce the video: Called to Be the Church Training: Why I Give (youtube.com/watch?v=KcWMNRInLtY&list=PLQDu-SgFb3Ri_n1T_wvmVB6a3i8CaX6wm&index=1) Watch the video.

Your Story

Distribute pens and paper. Have participants work through this exercise in pairs, with the co-leads keeping time and moving things along.

Round 1 (20 min.)

Taking turns, each person listens and takes notes as their partner shares their responses to:

- What brought you into The United Church of Canada or to this congregation?
- Why do you stay?
- What is so special about this church?

Round 2 (20 min.)

Each person listens as their partner answers the following questions and forms their story. Notes are taken to help each person remember their *Why I Give* story.

- Why do you give? (Why—not how or what.)
- Why do you give to God's mission—in your congregation, your community, and through Mission & Service?
- What is the impact of your gift? What difference do we make?

Round 3 (15 min.)

Each partner takes a turn (about 7 min.) responding to:

- What did you, as the listener, find compelling or want to know more about?
- How would this story invite others to join you in supporting our church's mission?

END (10 min.)

Encourage each participant to take time to reflect on their story and add more notes. Later, they might write out their story and seek opportunities to practise their story with other volunteers. They might plan to share their story with a friend, with a group in the congregation, or in worship.

Do what you can as leaders to help them improve the story and make it even more impactful.

Close with a prayer of thanksgiving. See additional stewardship prayers on pp. 42–43.

Narrative Budgets

The Narrative or ministry-based budget tells the story of your ministry through words and pictures. It shows how generosity impacts your community and empowers your people to work for God's mission in our world.

This communication tool **does not replace a line-item budget**, but rather supplements it as it

- communicates complex financial information for a broader audience
- links vision, values, and ministry with financial priorities
- helps develop a deeper understanding of the impact of our ministry
- inspires generosity and giving because people can see how their gifts change lives
- encourages people to discuss the needs of the ministry more deeply
- tells others about the mission and ministry of the congregation
- reflects how each person's giving is an expression of their faith

The Narrative Budget recognizes that we do not give money **to the church** so much as give money **through the church** to translate God's mission into action. It tells the story of what the money **does** (helps feed the hungry and serves the homeless) not where the money **goes** (paying for heat, salaries).

The time it takes to produce this critical resource is an investment. Once you have produced your first Narrative Budget, you can update it annually with stories of the most recent year's accomplishments.

We suggest including your Narrative Budget as part of the invitation package you will be sharing widely.

Start with a One-Page Narrative Budget

If a Narrative Budget is a new idea for your community, start with a one-page budget (examples from United Churches on united-church.ca/stewardship). Next year you can take it a step further.



The story of the ministry is the important element here. If the task of allocating the line-item budget into the ministry categories is daunting, don't give up. Just tell the story of **what the money does**.

Decide who will prepare the Narrative Budget so it is ready in time for sharing with the congregation.

Enhance your Narrative Budget

- A letter from ministry personnel setting the theme for the coming year
- A prayer written especially for your congregation's ministry and used regularly throughout the year
- Track the gift of time—volunteer opportunities and impact
- Include more stewardship information, such as giving charts or a Q&A about the stewardship program
- Include more Mission & Service information: search united-church.ca for M&S at a Glance and the United Church Annual Report
- If you are putting this on your website, include video testimonials, e.g., "Why I come and why I stay"; highlight the impact of a ministry area





The support from the congregation for the ministry of the denomination through Mission & Service (see united-church.ca/community-and-faith/get-involved/generosity-through-mission-and-service to point to projects nearby and across the globe).

Invite

You have gathered some *Why I Give* stories and told the story of your ministry in a Narrative Budget. Now it is time to invite every person to make a meaningful, intentional gift to support the ministry of the local community of faith and the Mission & Service of the United Church.



As you decide how you are going to make your invitations, please be sure to consider the new realities of the COVID-19 pandemic. Check with your local health unit and follow all government mandated requirements and guidelines. With the necessary physical distancing and use of masks, inviting can still be done safely.

Include Everyone

Whichever method of inviting others to give you choose, make sure everyone in your community of faith is included. Sharing the story with everyone is important and allows everyone to make their own decision in response to the invitation. Beginning with thanks allows the opportunity to acknowledge all gifts. It also allows for a clear communication that all gifts make a difference and are welcome. The request is for each person to make a **prayerful, intentional,** and **meaningful gift**—whatever the amount might be.

Whenever you are inviting people to support your ministry it is an opportunity to

- tell the story of the faith community and how it makes a difference in the lives of individuals in your community and in the world through the ministry of the Mission & Service of the United Church
- share how people think and feel about the ministry of the congregation
- affirm past and present involvement and discover new gifts, talents, and needs
- renew participation in the mission of the faith community and grow in Christian stewardship

Face-to-Face Invitations

The best way to invite others to support the ministry of your congregation is for one person to tell another person, face-to-face, why they support this ministry and to invite the other person to join them by making an intentional and meaningful gift.

A face-to-face invitation is a chance to

- thank people personally for contributions to the congregation
- talk about the ministry of the congregation and the denomination
- personally invite their generosity
- thank them again

For the giver, it is an opportunity to

- plan their gift in the context of the ministry of the congregation
- learn more about what their generosity accomplishes
- discuss the work of the church locally and the work of the denomination

For the person making the invitation, it is an opportunity to

- first plan their own gift before inviting others
- If fully internalize and own the ministry of the congregation and the denomination
- listen to the needs and concerns of others and pass them on to the appropriate leaders

Community Meal(s)

If asking an individual face-to-face is new for you, or if you suspect there would be significant resistance to such conversations in your community, consider hosting a Community Meal(s). A meal is a fun way to share *Why I Give* stories and the Narrative Budget, and to give each guest their letter with Decision-Making tools and a Response Card. There is a step-by-step guide to hosting a Community Meal on pp. 15–16 in the Planning Workbook. Also, check out the video *Inviting Generosity – Community Meals* at youtu.be/yG303-YB4lk. Gathering together for a meal and conversation is a wonderful opportunity to build and model community. At the table, we are fed both physically and spiritually as we eat together, learn together, and pray together. It is at the table that we discover what it is to have enough to share with our neighbours. At the table, we are encouraged; we learn we are not alone and that we are each appreciated and loved.



Gathering

There are various ways to organize a meal to reach as many people as possible:

- Gatherings of six or eight in individual homes
- One or more gatherings at the church property

When planning your meal(s) please follow all public health and government regulations and suggestions during the COVID-19 pandemic.

If there is more than one Community Meal, you might invite people randomly (see what new relationships are formed) or by neighbourhood, area of interest (e.g., outreach, music), or by stage of life (families, singles, seniors, young adults).

Meal

You might want to make food a special focus of your meal, e.g., a 50-mile or local menu, or you may feel comfortable hosting a community outreach dinner. You might ask another church to cater the meal (offering to do the same for them in the future).

Format

- Have co-hosts for the meal to share the responsibility.
- Invite as guest speaker someone who has benefitted by the mission of your congregation so they can share what a difference your community's generosity makes.
- Focus on one area of ministry, e.g., outreach, pastoral care, learning, worship, and invite a guest from that area to talk about what they do and why they do it.

Ahead of Time

- Set up for video(s): Called to Be the Church: Inspiring Generosity Community Meals (youtube.com/watch?v=yG303-YB4lk)
- Prepare a menu card with the agenda, meal plan, and maybe faith-sharing questions (see below).
- Print thank-you placemats that read "Thank you, God. Amen." in different languages (see united-church.ca/stewardship).



- Have copies of the invitation package for everyone. It will include:
 - Letter of Invitation
 - Narrative Budget
 - Giving Guide and Proportional Giving Chart or Step Chart
 - Response Card and return envelope
 - Other vehicles that draw attention to the ministry of the congregation and the giving program
- Faith-sharing questions printed on cards at the tables or on a flipchart or shown on a screen:
 - What gift have you most recently received? From whom? What did it mean to you?
 - What gift have you most recently given away? To whom? Why?
 - Whom do you consider to be a role model of a generous and giving person?

Gather

Co-hosts welcome everyone and review the purpose and outline of the evening.

First Course

Table hosts welcome their guests and invite people to introduce themselves and to reply to the following questions:

■ What brought you to _____ Church? Why do you stay?

Following the grace and while the first course is being served, show one of the videos.

Select a grace from the many suggestions at united-church.ca/ stewardship.

Main Course

Inspire: During the main course, the table host shares their Why I Give story.

Main Course and Dessert

The co-host introduces the guest speaker and/or others who will share *Why I Give* stories. The co-host reviews the Invitation Package and shares their own *Why I Give* story. Looking at the church's Narrative Budget, the co-host invites everyone to share dreams of what might be done with increased generosity.

Invite: The co-host then invites others to join them in supporting the mission of the church with a personally meaningful and intentional gift to the congregation. The host also refers to the Decision-Making Tools (pp. 32-35) and asks that people make a prayerful decision, sharing their decision on the Response Card. Details are given as to when and how the Response Cards should be returned. The aim is to have everyone in the congregation participate.

Dessert

The co-host invites people to discuss all that they have listened to and to submit questions to the table hosts. These questions will be shared with the Giving Team.

Wrap-Up and Follow-Up

Thank: The co-hosts thank everyone for coming to share the meal. They also share the next steps in the giving program and emphasize again the importance of the Response Cards. The concluding prayer might include another "Thank you." Within two or three days, the hosts send a (handwritten) thank-you note to everyone who attended, reminding them to return the Response Cards.

Letter of Invitation

Plan to send a letter to every individual or household in your community of faith immediately following Sunday 1, or plan to hand out the letter with the Narrative Budget at a Community Meal. The objective is to write an inspiring letter that is also personal. It is an opportunity to tell the story of your faith community and how it makes a difference in the lives of individuals in your community and in the world through the ministry of the Mission & Service of The United Church of Canada.

Letter-Writing Guidelines

- Your letter needs to sound authentic and natural and reflect the culture of your community of faith.
- Remind your readers that God is the provider of an abundance of resources for ministry and mission. Communities of faith have many assets, including financial ones, with which to carry out their mission; your congregation is rich in faith, service, love, talent, and life experience. Remind your readers of their abundance. How does your community offer thanks for God's generosity and respond to God's generosity by serving others?
- Hand-address each letter with a note of encouragement (e.g., "We are so grateful for all you do in working with your Sunday school program.") and sign each one.
- Begin your letter with gratitude and give thanks for past and current gifts. Where possible, be specific about each individual's contribution to the ministry of the congregation (with total if appropriate) and tell them what their generosity has, and will, accomplish.
- Keep your letter
 - concise—ideally one page
 - easy to read
 - story-based—connected to your ministry and Why I Give stories
 - framed in positive language—do not beg or use guilt
- Invite each person to consider giving time and talent, as well as treasure.

Different Letters for Different Donors

A letter that invites your community to be generous with its givings will be more successful if you tailor the letter to different groups in the congregation. People give for different reasons and find different kinds of information helpful when making their giving decisions. It is wise to identify a strategy of creating different letters that works for your community.

So how might you group people in the congregation and what might be unique about each letter? Use the following table to help you determine the appropriate groups for your congregation.

Group	Message
Those on Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR)	Thank them for their consistent support of the mission. Invite them to consider increasing their gift and include the tools to do so, making it as easy and seamless as possible.
New donors in the past (number) months	Welcome them to the community. Share some of the highlights of mission and ministry in the time before they arrived and how their contributions have had an impact recently.
Occasional attenders or donors For example: those who return home for the holidays; those who go only on holidays; those who are summer attenders	Thank them for their generosity and how their giving helps make a difference throughout the year. Share some highlights of your ministry in the time between their visits. Avoid any language that smacks of guilt or judgment about their giving pattern.
Those with an interest in a particular ministry For example: outreach, church school, youth work, music	Thank them for their general support of the ministry of the congregation and then include stories about the impact of their giving on the area of their interest.
Over 65	Include encouragement to consider long- term support through a bequest or other planned gift. Include a reply card that they can return to indicate their interest in pursuing this.
Those using envelopes	If you are a PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) congregation, you might encourage people to shift from envelope giving to signing up for PAR. Include a PAR brochure; share a quote from someone in your congregation who uses PAR, sharing why they choose to give in this way, e.g., it's easier and helps with cash flow. See united-church.ca/community-faith/get-involved/ways-give/giving-monthly-through-par.

If you are writing to several different groups of people, such as regular givers and occasional givers, customize the letters but keep the main elements the same. See the examples that follow.



Letter Template for Those Who Already Give Regularly

Decision-Making Tools

These tools will help people make informed decisions based on concrete information.

While people may know the amount they currently give to support the mission of the church, they are often unaware of the generosity of others or what might be expected of them. The Proportional Giving Chart helps people see what proportion of their income (either net or gross) they are giving to the mission of the church. You can include the version that aligns with the giving pattern of your people—weekly, monthly, or yearly. This chart also helps identify what the weekly or monthly donation would need to be if people wished to make a specific proportional gift—two percent or 10 percent (a biblical tithe).

Intention Sheet and Response Card

There are many benefits to keeping track of the response to the giving program. Doing so will be more successful if returning the Response Card is positioned as a means of including and honouring everyone's gifts.

By asking *everyone* to return a Response Card (in a sealed envelope), regardless of how it is filled out, you show that you are valuing everyone and their contribution—whatever that may be.

This is a pastoral matter and will be more readily received if it is approached that way. Successful programs have a person with strong pastoral skills who calls those who have not yet returned their Response Card, offering a gentle reminder and sharing the rationale for giving.

On the next page is a sample that you can adapt for your own purposes. To help members make an informed and meaningful gift, Riverbend United Church in Edmonton created a Making Your Intention sheet to help determine the amount given to God's mission. Participants kept this for their records and filled in the Response Card, which was returned to the church.




Step Chart

Communication

Communication is vital to the success of any program. Here are some suggestions to get the juices flowing and to start talking about *Called to Be the Church* in your community. Add your own creativity to suit your context, check out ideas for bulletin covers, digital slides, logos, and other resources at united-church.ca/ stewardship, and refer to the Communication planning resource on p. 18 of the Planning Workbook.

Use all communication channels possible—congregational announcements, bulletin inserts, church e-mail lists, and social media—and stay connected throughout the program to build interest, enthusiasm, and commitment.

Program Announcements

As soon as your plans are formalized, communicate what is being planned to build anticipation and support and to encourage participation. If you are mailing letters, make sure they are timed to arrive two weeks prior to Sunday 1.

In your written and verbal messages, be sure to communicate the following:

Why: Our congregation carries out God's mission locally in our own community and in the wider world through the Mission & Service of the United Church. This is important and makes a difference. We are inviting everyone in our community to learn more about how we do this and to make their own informed and intentional gift so we can continue this good work.

What: This is our congregational giving program—to invite everyone to contribute to God's mission for us.

When: We will begin our program (*date*), continuing for (*number*) weeks until (*date*).

How: We will be inviting participation through a mailing to every member or a Community Meal being planned for (*date*).

Sample: Verbal Announcement, Bulletin Insert, or E-mail

Edit or rewrite to suit your community:

Our worship is filled with scripture, song, and story about God's generosity and our response—discovering that Discipleship Is Stewardship. In our worship we regularly say what we believe when we say A New Creed. We believe that we are called as individuals, families, communities of faith, and as a denomination to follow in the way of Jesus to bring about a world of justice and peace.

I respond to this call and give to the ministry of (name of community of faith) because (include personal "Why I Give" paragraph).

Over the coming weeks, we will focus on how we love our neighbours by supporting God's mission. We will share more stories about why we give; how our generosity makes a difference here at (name of your congregation); how we have an impact on the community around us; and how, through the Mission & Service of the United Church, we respond to this call nationally and globally.

We will have worship and learning opportunities for all ages. (*Include details about what is planned*.) Also, we will invite you to join us in giving an intentional and meaningful gift to this ministry.

Sample: Personalized Letter or E-mail

Mail a letter to each individual or family in the congregation. Adapt the following wording for your context:

Opening

Dear (handwritten salutation using first name—or Mr., Ms., Mrs. and surname).

A New Creed calls us to be the church: to celebrate God's presence, to live with respect in Creation, to love and serve others, to seek justice and resist evil, and to proclaim Jesus, crucified and risen, our judge and our hope.

We are called to follow in the way of Jesus as individuals, families, communities of faith, and as a denomination. (I/We) respond to this call and give to the ministry of (name of your pastoral charge/community of faith) because...(begin with a "Why I Give" paragraph from the Giving Team co-leads).

Over the coming weeks, our community of faith will be focused on how we are Called to Be the Church. We will share more stories about why we give, how our generosity makes a difference here at (name of your pastoral charge/community of faith), how we affect the community around us, and how, through the Mission & Service of the United Church, we respond to this call nationally and globally.

Join us week by week to hear the stories of how we are called—in our worship and through a variety of learning opportunities. (Include notice of children's and youth programs, and adult learning events.)

(Explain how you will be inviting everyone's participation: through one or more community events or via a mailing.)

- Draft a letter to introduce your giving program
- Throughout the program, communicate your message on screens, websites, and with e-news

Closing

Between now and then we encourage you and all members of your family to prayerfully consider your own reasons for giving and how you will respond to this call. We hope this will be a rich opportunity for you to reflect on the blessings of your life and how you can live out your own response.

Thank

Thank Everyone

A culture of generosity is built on a foundation of gratitude. In a culture of gratitude, we thank God for the blessings in our lives. God is generous again, again, and again. Say thank you again, again, and again—and in many different ways.

We thank individuals and groups for their generous support of the ministry in their community. We cannot thank enough. We give thanks for every gift.

Timely, Sincere, Personal

We make sure our gratitude and thanks are

- timely: closely connected to when the gift is received
- sincere: communicating what a difference the gift will make
- personal: face-to-face or in a handwritten note

Find opportunities to say thank you directly. Find opportunities to write personal notes of thanks. Thanking needs to be planned if it is to become a habit in your congregation and for everyone who gives to be thanked.

Make It Timely

- Don't wait until the end of the program.
- Thank donors as soon as the Response Card arrives, phoning them to say you received the gift and are grateful.
- Thank every new donor as soon as possible with a phone call or handwritten note.

Make It Sincere

- Adding appreciation to thanks builds sincerity. Acknowledgement is thanks. Think about ways of adding appreciation—affirming the qualities of the donor, their motivation, and their hopes.
- Show yourself in the thanks and connect yourself with your donor. Wear your heart on your sleeve!
- Add a simple homemade gift, such as cookies or bags of special tea with a note that reads: "Every time you make a cup of tea or have a cookie, remember that we are grateful for your generosity."

Make It Personal

- Formal and generalized expressions of gratitude are often necessary. However, they lack the personal touch. Use "I," "we," and "you" in your sentences so that the tone of your message feels warm.
- Be specific about the reasons for being grateful—the impact of the gift or your personal reaction to their generosity.
- The person who did the inviting is most likely to be the best person to do the thanking. Handwritten notes and speaking face-to-face are the most personal ways to thank someone.

Make Giving Thanks a Habit

- Send a handwritten note to a few people each week—thank leaders for their time and talent; remain connected to those who are homebound, asking for their prayers for the work of the congregation; thank every person who makes a contribution to worship services (e.g., choir members, greeters).
- Every once in a while, **take a look at how you offer thanks** and how you might refresh it a little, or think of a new or unusual way of saying thank you.
- **Encourage others** to develop the habit of thanking within the congregation and in the rest of their lives. For example, each time they meet, have Board/Council members write thank-you notes to people they have witnessed contributing in some way to the congregation's mission. Have the Board/Council members hand deliver their notes the following week.
- Always, be sure to thank in ways that build relationships!



Wrap-Up and Evaluation

People have been **inspired**, everyone has been **invited**, all have responded in some way, and you have had a celebration of **thanks**! The important parts of this program have been accomplished, and just a bit more energy and focus are needed to wrap things up. Taking as much care with this, as with everything else, will have long-term benefits.

Within a week or two of Sunday 5 (or the last Sunday of your chosen program), gather the Giving Team and take time to debrief the experience of developing and guiding the giving program. This can be informal, with someone taking notes to keep track of any next steps and to help next year's Giving Team.

Review Your Experience

Complete the **Evaluation** form that appears on p. 20 of the Planning Workbook using the following questions to help your team.

- Revisit the goals and objectives you established when you were getting started (see pp. 5–8 of the Planning Workbook). What was fulfilled? What changed?
- What went well?
- What did you do differently?
- What would you do differently in the future?
- What did you learn?
- What did you hear?
- Consider who needs to know this information:
 - ministry personnel: about pastoral issues
 - envelope secretary: to provide updated information
 - Christian educators or others: to provide program ideas

Follow-Up

- Report to your congregation's Board or Council.
- Plan further communication now and over the course of the next year.
- How will you report on any future gifts received?
- How will you update people about the impact of their generosity?
- Identify when to get started for next year. Since the worship materials for 2022 will be for the Season of Epiphany, you will receive the Worship Sampler with your October 2021 e-newsletter *E-ssentials*. You may wish to keep your Program Guide and Planning Workbook. As always, *Called to Be the Church 2022* will be available online.


