# Highlights from the National UCW Annual Meeting, September 16 to 20, 2024

On Monday, September 16, 2024, UCW women from across Canada arrived at Queen of the Apostles Renewal Centre in Mississauga, Ontario, for the National UCW (NUCW) meeting. Each Regional UCW was represented by two women. We were about to embark on a busy time of

learning, discussion, worship, and fellowship.

President Barbara Davison's theme is "LEAD NOT ONLY BY WORD, BUT BY ACTION";

SCRIPTURE: Nehemiah Ch 2:20 in part and 1 Corinthians 12: 12-27; HYMNS: "How Firm a



Foundation" VU #660 and "Let us Build a House" MV #1. Unfortunately, President Barbara was not able to attend the meeting. Many thanks to Past President Nancy Risto for stepping in to chair the meetings during the week.

We had morning worship and vespers each day, led by women from different regions. Each day included business meetings, guest speakers, and time with our friends from across the country.

#### **NUCW Business**

Reports were received from our President, Regional Presidents, and others. Win Czum, our representative on the Women's Interchurch Council, reminded us about the 2025 World Day of Prayer service, written by Christian women on Cooke Island and where to find resources. Pat Edmond, our Alumnae representative has been inviting alumnae members to share



their memories from years they spent on the National UCW and will share these memories in future issues of Keeping in Touch. Angie Musonza, Church in Mission, gave an update on the move to share office space (United, Anglican, and Presbyterian churches) which is anticipated for 2026, 'Then Let Us Sing' release, Climate Motivators, Partner Council of the United Church of Canada, and the African Consultation on Human Sexuality and Gender Diversification.



On Thursday, Carolle presented the budget for the coming year, which was passed with a few amendments.

On Thursday, Barbara DeJeet
President-Elect nominee introduced
herself, told us about her experiences
with UCW. She is also a licensed lay
workshop leader and a sacramental
elder and has planned various events.
Barbara DeJeet was elected as the
President-Elect.

Phyllis Robinson was elected as Communications Chair as a nonvoting member.

Committees were created on Friday morning including Finance, Grant, Communications and Affirming.

# **Guest Speakers**

The Moderator, The Right Rev. Dr. Carmen Lansdowne was our first guest speaker of the week. She spoke about the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in 2025. The Centennial service will take place in St. John's NFLD. 45<sup>th</sup> General Conference is next summer in Calgary and will be a hybrid format. Theme - Visions and Dreams. Knox UC in Calgary will be hosting the installation of the moderator on August 11<sup>th</sup>, 2025. Rev. Carmen then discussed what is happening in Israel and Palestine. She asked what do you need from the church to feel confident to say something and to say it strongly. Discussion followed and participants provided input to Rev. Carmen. Rev. Carmen will write a letter to send to the PM. She will also send it to Angie to send out to NUCW and suggested you write a handwritten note to go with it to say that you agree.



**Honourary Life Membership** A UCW Honourary Life Membership was presented to the Right Rev. Dr. Carmen Lansdowne.

Amy Crawford, Team Lead Identity and Mission led us in a bible study "We are Christ's body acting in the world" If you were a body part in the church, what would you be and why? 1st Corinthians 12: 12-31 was discussed with questions from Amy. A parting question to think about: "What is your part – what actions do you need to take to help your UCW, your church or the UCC nationally and globally?"

Sarah Charters, Executive Minister, Philanthropy/ President UCC Foundation, Jenna Yango Leonard, Foundation Coordinator, and Harry Li, Executive Officer, Finance UCC reviewed NUCW funds. Jenna gave a summary of the NUCW funds held in the UCC Foundation. Each year a portion of the UCW Endowment funds are removed to disbursement income which is 4.25% of the funds average balance of the previous 8 quarters. Harry gave a summary of the NUCW funds held in the UCC. Carolle asked for quarterly statements. Carolle asked if the anniversary we hold every five years could be considered a special project and some funds from the Life Membership Fund could be used for the anniversary. Harry will do some research into this for us. Sarah reminded us that the funds that the foundation holds are externally restricted and have designations by those who set them up, but UCW approves where the funds go, within those designations.

Ruth Sandeu, French Ministries Ruth gave an update on French Ministries. French Ministry Staff — There are five on staff of French Ministries. Churches and Ministries — There are about 22 churches and about 4 other ministries. Communities of faith — There are many communities of faith in New Brunswick, Quebec, Winnipeg (with First Nations). They are in conversations with other provinces and regions and communities. They are working toward creating a new institute of theological study. Activities of faith — AGA 2024; they have activities in February around Black History month. They have a volleyball team and a soccer team. They run retreats, meetings, and pastoral visits. She covered some upcoming events. For more information their website is egliseunie.ca

Ruth Noble, Executive Director, Affirm United Ruth Noble talked about what it means to be affirming. All are welcome, inclusion, being safe, and meeting needs such as gender-neutral bathrooms. There are 20 ministries affirming this fall, 180 in the process and 320 that are affirmed. Affirm United works for full inclusion of people, membership is open to those who support this work. Affirm United is a partner with the UCC, but they are independent and are also working with other denominations and a mosque to become affirming.

The Affirm program started in 1995 and the first affirming ministry was Augustine UC in Winnipeg. The goal of an Affirming process is a public, intentional, explicit welcome for diverse gender identities and sexual orientation. Elements to the affirming process: encountering the need, embark on a time of education and discernment, (watch documentary 1946), embark on your decision around voting and decide together and move towards the vote of affirming.

Rev. Jennifer Henry, Executive Minister Organizational Development and Strategy (Planning, Communication, Growth) led a workshop called "Deep, Bold and Daring: Living the Denomination's new Call" Jennifer talked about the denomination's new call. "Deep Spirituality, Bold Discipleship, Daring Justice"

Deep Spirituality - Where is Christ showing up and inviting you –compelling you—to go deep? Bold Discipleship – Where have you seen bold discipleship? Who has inspired you by their bold discipleship? Daring justice: Where are we right now – as this United Church – pressed to daring justice? And alongside whom?



Jennifer reviewed the GCO Strategic Plan: Common Good – indigenous Pathways – Leadership – Climate – Justice – Growth (Renew, Create, Invite). Strategic Objectives are to embolden justice, invigorate leadership, nurture common good, deepen integrity, walk indigenous pathways, strengthen invitation.

Goals are to renew existing communities of faith, create new ones, emerging communities and invite people to the UC of Canada. Showed a video (30 seconds) which was shown during stars on ice (3 times in a show) and at Pearson airport over the summer. 100unitedyears.ca

Joni Shawana, Healing Program Coordinator, Indigenous Ministries & Justice, UCC spoke on the Healing Fund via Zoom Joni gave a background on the Healing Fund and some of the projects that have been funded in the past. She talked about the 'Mother & Baby' Welcome Bag Project which the UCW helped fund through the Healing Fund in 2023. In 2024 the UCW funds toward the Healing Project are for the Fort McKay Metis Nation Association "Healing in the kitchen" (Fort McMurray, Albert). Their primary goal is to create a culturally affirming and supportive space for healing, reconciliation and holistic well-being. More information to come on this project.

**Kim Baird 65**<sup>th</sup> **Anniversary Update** Chair of the 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Planning Committee, from EOOR, Kim announced that there are 1,036 sleeps until the 65<sup>th</sup>! EOOR is excited to host the 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. The planning committee consists of Chair Kim Baird, Carolle Dallas-Arbuckle, Cheryl Sullivan, Charlotte Hoy, Nancy Desjardins, Linda Stronski and Denise Wood.

The 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration will be held on July 19<sup>th</sup> – 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2027 at the Hilton Garden Inn, Ottawa Airport. Theme: Hear Our Voice. Scripture: Proverbs 8; The logo will be revealed soon.

The Hilton Garden Inn has guaranteed the room cost at \$195 plus taxes per night. Breakfast is on your own. There is a hotel shuttle, and arrangements will be made if you are coming in by train.

#### Summer Event

This is an annual event put on by Antler River Watershed UCW that happens at Siloam United Church on July 20, 2024 with the theme: Go Make A Difference" and this was clearly reflected in our guest speakers and special entertainment. They are truly making a difference in the lives of people in our community.

We ask each area to participate in this event by welcoming participants, doing worship, saying grace, thanking our speaker, thanking the afternoon entertainment and lastly one area doing the courtesies.

We started the day with coffee and muffins served in the atrium at Siloam. The start of the day in the sanctuary with the Land Acknowledgement. We had greetings from Siloam United Church, Kathy Douglas welcomed us on behalf of Antler River Watershed Region, and Marilyn Mitchell welcomed us on behalf of Antler River Watershed UCW.

We then had a sing song with Neila Lawson leading us in various songs and she also helped with songs during worship and communion.

We then had Mona Wuytenberg from Karen's Place give us a brief update on what is happening at Karen's Place and the success they've experience. Karen's Place provides housing and supports for



women 50-plus who are homeless or in danger of becoming homeless. The home, located at the corner of Colborne and Central Streets in London, can accommodate 5 women as well as a "house mother."

Our guest speaker, Jordan Boyd from Youth Opportunities Unlimited (YOU) was introduced by Marilyn Mitchell. Jordan shared with us some of the statistics about youth homelessness and addiction, as well as telling us about the various programs Y.O.U. offers, and the difference they are making in the lives of those with whom they interact. Jordan was thanked by Elgin, and then Essex offered the meal grace.

The folks at Siloam always do a wonderful job of feeding us at Summer Event. The buffet was laden with a variety of salads (including the ever-popular popcorn salad), cold meats and buns, with cake topped with berries for dessert.

In the afternoon, Neila led us in a sing song and then Laurel Kenney gave us an update on the National UCW Project. The Healing Fund was chosen as our special five-year project (running from 2023 until the UCW 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in 2027). The Healing Fund provides a bursary to ensure Indigenous women and children receive adequate support and encouragement through culture and language programming. Laurel also shared information about the ongoing situation at the Oneida Nation of the Thames. Despite money being committed by the government for the Lake Huron Water Pipeline, progress has been very slow and people are continuing to buy bottled water.

The afternoon entertainment was provided by a 5-piece string ensemble for "El Sistema South London," led by Steve Wooley. They were introduced and thanked by Maureen Tipping. El Sistema provides music instruction as well as instruments to youth who may not otherwise have access. What a wonderful opportunity for the youth in our community! El Sistema was started in Venezuela in 1995 and now exists in several other countries around the world.

Mary Dillon, Dean, closed the day with a benediction, using the words of Swiss philosopher Henri Frederic Amiel: "Life is short. And we have so little time to gladden the hearts of those who travel the way with us. So be swift to love. And make haste to be kind. Amen."

From the evaluation forms we were fortunate to recruit two more people and have several suggestions for theme speaker and musical entertainment. The Planning Committee will begin making plans this Fall for our next Summer Event which will be held on July 19, 2025.



#### The Catholic Women's League of Canada Report

The 104th Annual National Convention was held in Saskatoon on August 11 - 14, 2024. When National UCW president Barbara Davison broke her arm and was unable to travel she phoned and asked me if I would attend on her behalf. I immediately said yes. Little did I know that the theme of this year's convention was from Isiah 6:8 Here I am Lord, send me. I felt I was living their theme. The convention was packed with activities as well as inspirational



speakers and their annual meeting. The activities began the day before the convention with the opening banquet. St. Patrick's Church has a large Filipino congregation, and they hosted the evening sharing cultural food and entertainment. From that time on each day was filled. Sunday and Thursday mornings began with special events pertinent to Saskatoon. A trip to Wanuskewin Heritage Centre on Sunday for lunch and to the Berry Barn for breakfast on Thursday. Sunday evening the Convention officially started with Mass at the Cathedral of Holy Family. Each day started with a Eucharistic Celebration. Guests who were not Catholic could chose to receive a personal blessing. This was a reminder of one of the differences in our Churches, with the United Church of Canada believing in the open table communion service.

Special guests were seated together. I had the opportunity to meet and spend the week with Cathy Reid, Board President of Women's Inter-Church Council of Canada (WICC) and President of Women's Missionary Society Canada (WMS), her colleague Janet Brewer Executive Member of WMS, and Mary Nordick, the CWL representative to WICC and former CWL National President. I was

welcomed by these wise and active women. Mary was able to guide us with the ins and outs of the Convention. Being used to UCW meetings it was a surprising feeling to have a strong male presence at the meetings. There were 4 Archbishops, 10-12 bishops and priests in attendance at most of the sessions. Plus on Tuesday a Monsignor was one of the invited guests. Any proposals that were made during the convention have to go for approval by the Most Rev. Wayne Lobsinger, Auxiliary Bishop of Hamilton, the CWL National Spiritual Advisor and then to the regional Archbishops and/or Bishops.

The concerns of the CWL mirror many of the UCW concerns, declining membership, and how to continue the work



and service to our communities of faith. There was a mutual understanding and acceptance that we all, UCW, WICC, WMS and CWL are serving God in our own ways. I shared this thought as part of the UCW greeting "As women of faith the CWL and UCW have played and continue to play important roles in their churches, their communities, in their provinces and territories, and in our country. As you participate in your Convention may you deepen your faith and be inspired to

continue your endeavors while you follow the theme of your convention "Here I am Lord, send me." I believe that this holds true for all of us.

Coming Soon: Then Let Us Sing!

TLUS The release of *Then Let Us Sing!* — the United Church's new *digital* music resource—is getting closer. Final selection of the new hymns and songs has been made, final layout and design is in process, and the digital platform in process.

Then Let Us SING! will be The United Church of Canada's most current—and future-focused—source of music for congregational singing and worship planning. It will be released in January 2024 as part of the United Church's centennial celebrations.

The project's Material Curation group has been very busy over these last four years:

- receiving over 1,500 submissions from composers and text writers from across Canada and internationally, along with 1,000+ songs and hymns from published sources
- creating a Sampler of about 25 pieces for review by 200 communities of faith (including some UCW groups) in the fall of 2023 and reviewing the feedback

selecting the 150+ hymns and songs for the final collection

#### What to Expect

- New hymns and songs that
  - o use fresh language for God and accessible musical styles.
  - o lift up racialized, Indigenous, francophone, and LGBTQQITTPA+ and Two Spirit people, as well as people with disabilities, and people of diverse linguistic comm.
- Digitization will provide great versatility for communities of faith. A subscription to *Then Let Us SING!* will include *all permissions* for legally copying, printing, projecting and streaming the music.
- There will be no need to buy a new hymn book; and in the future, new music can easily be added. For those who prefer to have a book, however, a hard copy booklet of the new hymns is planned for later in 2025.

#### And There's More

• A team coordinated by Rev. Phil Wilson has interpreted nearly twenty hymns into American Sign Language (ASL) and five into langue des signes québecoise (LSQ). These videos will be available online as part of our witness to the wider church.

Workshops and training sessions are planned in the new year to introduce *Then Let Us SING!* across the country. Keep an eye open for news about events in your area.
