Supporting Congregations and Faith Communities



Regionally-based Growth Animators offer support for ministers and congregations. They work with leaders to help cultivate the conditions that will rejuvenate and invigorate communities of faith so they don't just survive, but thrive.

For example, five United Churches in Regina are collaborating on Sunday morning worship leadership in a way that frees up ministry personnel for other tasks. Conversations with their Growth Animator clarified their deeper purpose and how to use their assets effectively. This renewed their sense of purpose and excitement for ministry growth, and together, they proposed a "Strong Towns Event" to address community gaps and foster collaboration.

"You've made a difference," ministry personnel told Sharon Ballantyne, a Growth Animator for Atlantic Canada, after a conversation held at a rural pastoral charge in Nova Scotia. "You've helped us focus on how to engage the congregation in our outreach vision." This dialogue created hope and renewed possibilities. Our faith calls us to love and serve. We need vibrant, hope-filled congregations to live out that call.

Supporting Faith Stewardship



Another direct support for congregations and communities of faith are the *Called to Be the Church: The Journey* programs, developed by the Community of Faith Stewardship Support Staff who work alongside leaders to support learning of Christian Stewardship.

Minnedosa United Church in Manitoba participated in the Stewardship Best Practices session, and had three coaching sessions with support staff over six months. Even though they were not in financial crisis, they were experiencing low median gift amounts and had not engaged in regular Stewardship conversations or programming for many years. The team crafted a letter inviting the congregation to participate in a full giving program and developed "stewardship moments" during worship. As a result, the goal for donations was met, 12 people increased their PAR gift amount, and there was no negative feedback on the "stewardship moments," which had been a concern.

Afterwards, the board chair was ecstatic about the team's success. "It has transformed the congregational culture to one of greater gratitude and hope."

Bold Justice to Create Dignity for All

For decades, our church has condemned all forms of racism and worked to eliminate systemic discrimination.

Committing to Anti-Racism



The 40 Days of Engagement on Anti-Racism program tackles internalized, systemic, and anti-Indigenous, anti-Asian, and anti-Black racism. "There are some people who don't want to talk about racism in the church," notes Adele Halliday (Anti-Racism Equity

Lead for the United Church). "However, it's important. There is work the church has committed itself to do as part of our faithful response to this call." Jesus and his disciples ministered to non-Jewish peoples too. If we are truly followers of Jesus, we recognize the face of God in all our siblings here in Canada and around the world.

Protecting Sexual and Gender Minorities

Mission *and* **Service** donations also help to protect sexual and gender minorities around the world.

Did vou know same-sex attraction is a crime in 63 countries, with 12 imposing the death penalty? "One of our partners in Kenya advocates strongly for the human rights of sexual minorities and that has caused him to be in jail," says the Rev. Michael Blair, the United Church's first openly gay General Secretary. "When we hear these stories, we can see this is a life and death matter."

Your support enables us to hold consultations globally, learning how to best protect sexual and gender minorities. These gatherings offer safe spaces for our Christian partners to discuss creating change locally. Thanks to your generosity, we also help shelter refugees escaping repressive regimes. This solidarity fosters peer learning, renewed energy, and powerful advocacy.

Fighting for Climate Resiliency and Justice



Hardship due to climate change is a major issue in today's world. Thanks to your support of Mission and **Service**, we help build climate resiliency in communities all over Canada and around the world.

For Siloam United Church in London, Ontario, establishing a community garden was their way of connecting with nature. Partnering with a non-profit, they turned vacant land into an urban farm, growing fresh produce for local food banks.

How far would you go to protect the climate resiliency of your community? Marita and Ester travelled from Guatemala to Japan to learn how they could better support their Indigenous Mayan communities.

"There are many difficulties that the Indigenous Mayan people, especially women, face. Poverty is still a significant issue. Problems such as alcoholism and discrimination among ethnic groups is high," Ester and Marita shared. "These problems leave many people in difficult financial and nutritional situations."

With your support, Marita and Ester were able to travel to Japan to learn sustainable agriculture and community development. "We are growing varieties of vegetables, taking advantage of



each vegetable's characteristics, and we look forward to learning more about this during the training. We can improve nutrition in the local market by growing vegetables in multiple varieties," Marita and Ester shared.

Indigenous Justice, Healing, and Reconciliation

Indigenous Peoples in Canada live in a society filled with harmful and untrue stereotypes with historical roots that are reinforced through generations. As a result, they face overt and systemic discrimination in all areas of their lives.

If one of you wrongs another in any way, you must confess your guilt and pay full restitution. (Numbers 5: 6–7)



Thanks to your support, we are making a difference. Since 1994, the United Church Healing Fund has provided grants to support initiatives addressing the intergenerational effects of the residential school system. Indigenous communities receive funding for healing, language education, and culture projects.

Protecting Indigenous Languages

Inuinnaqtun is the native language of the Inuinnait people, who live in Canada's central Arctic region. Like many Indigenous languages, it was traditionally passed on through everyday interactions. But many Inuinnaits were removed from their communities and sent to residential schools. As a result, less than 500 Inuinnaits can speak Inuinnaqtun fluently today.

For the Pitquhirnikkut Ilihautiniq/Kitikmeot Heritage Society in Cambridge Bay, Nunavut, the Healing Fund has supported Inuinnaqtun language mentors with resources to offer one-onone language immersion sessions.

Your gifts help to bring healing and justice to Indigenous Peoples by preserving Indigenous languages.

Working with the Community

The Regina Native Outreach Ministries (RNOM) partners with First Nations and Métis Services as well as the local hospital and library to support new mothers. The mothers were asked if they would like a Mother and Baby Welcome Bag and most are pleased to receive one. "Many of the mothers are surprised to find items in the bag for them and are moved by the personal card enclosed." A knitting group also provides blankets for the bags.

Also in partnership with RNOM, the Regina Public Library created a new space in its downtown location. Community Commons was created to break down barriers and connect library visitors with cultural and social resources such as language and literacy programs, harm reduction counselling, and training. RNOM's board worked with library staff to set up regular offerings of traditional Indigenous teachings, Christian teachings, Indigenous voices, and knitting circle sessions. The library has encouraged RNOM to propose more programming for the Community Commons.
