Cora not only supported her local church and organizations but was quick to recognize a need and take action. She traveled to South Africa with a couple of friends to visit the women who had been to Canada on a M & S exchange. While there she discovered that Megan and her husband were trying to run a school and provide a daily meal for farm workers' children. Upon arriving home Cora said, "We have seen the need. What are we going to do about it?" – and the African School Project that raised over \$25 000 was born and continued supporting the school for about 10 years. Cora's generosity knew no limits. She was quick to support projects that addressed the needs of children and she anonymously supported many small churches in the presbytery. Cora was a dynamo on any Nominations Committee. Not only was she able to recognize the abilities of others, convince the nominees that they had the skills for the job but was there to encourage, advise and support them in their leadership roles. She touched the lives of many people in the UCC as well as the world and was an example of a true Christian committed to doing God's work. My thanks to alumnae members, Esther Lewis and Joyce MacKinnon, for sharing their memories of Cora.

From the Affirming Committee

Information taken from "Open Hearts – Resources for Affirming Ministries in The United Church of Canada," written by Alyson C Huntly in conjunction with the Affirming Ministries Program Coordinators. Revised April 2020.

Affirming Ministries seek to go beyond issues of gender identity and sexual orientation to work for justice and inclusion for all people. Affirming Ministries work in many different ways toward the healing and wholeness of creation – challenging bias and discrimination based on appearance, ability, culture, class, or age; working to end racism; promoting economic justice; increasing accessibility; or caring for the planet.

Affirming Ministry Program encourages us to study what it means to be publicly welcoming and inclusive. We hope to provide information about it means to be an Affirming Ministry and help us discern what it means for National UCW Executive to become Affirming and how we might live that out in word and action.

The aims of Affirm United are; to educate and promote greater awareness and to end discrimination against people in our church, in our society and our own organization UCW, to support people of all sexual orientations and gender identities, age, racial/cultural backgrounds, physical ability, and family configurations.

On page 7 of the UCW Handbook, you will find the UCW Vision and Mission Statement.

Our Vision Statement reads: As women of faith, we believe in nurturing Christian spirituality by reaching out through commitment and devotion to all God's people in the promotion of truth, justice, peace, caring and respect for all throughout the earth, God's world; we believe in honouring God the Creator, and loving others through generous giving and joyful living; and we believe in affirming and strengthening ourselves both individually and together through creative study, prayer and action.

Our Mission Statement reads: Foster Christian commitment, faithfulness, and spirituality. Promote respect and love for all God's creation.

You are invited to wonder, question, explore, learn and discern the Affirming process with the National UCW Executive as it starts its journey to discovery and faith.

As the UCW women who sit on the National UCW Executive can change year to year, how can we commit as a National Executive to welcome, respect, support, encourage and provide a safe meeting environment for all the Regional UCW representatives as they attend and participate at the National level of UCW? Will UCW women say "Hear Our Voice, as we speak out and stand side by side?"

The Child Well-being Initiative (CWBI) Story

This is an abbreviated section of the story. If you would like the complete story of the dolls, please request it through our KIT email nucwcanada@gmail.com.

The landmark **UN Convention of the Rights of the Child** was signed in 1989. That was followed in 1990 by a **World Summit for Children** and the UN General Assembly **Special Session for Children** for 2001.

As a result, organizations like **Save the Children** and **UNICEF**, in Canada and around the world, pledged a **Global Movement for Children** affirming and standing in solidarity **with** children by engaging in concrete action for change in local communities around the world.

In July of 2007 at Ponoka, Alberta, Mary Jones hosted the first meeting of the child poverty interest group which included Janet Walter, Sharon Gillespie, Marilyn Thomas, Emmy Henry, Lillian Stewart, Sharon Prenevost. The group chose a name, set goals and developed a position statement premised on the question: **What if Alberta government policies were measured by the well-being of Alberta's children?**

Carolyn Pogue from Calgary, who became CWBI strategist, presented samples of an ambassador **rag doll** (pattern from a 1991 "Canadian Living Magazine") and a brightly painted birdhouse. The tag on the birdhouse read, **"Every bird but not every child can find a home."** In part, this is where the name of the **Hope doll** came.

The Hope dolls were presented to each of Alberta's 83 MLAs on the floor of the legislative assembly during the fall sitting of the Legislature in 2010 close to November 20th (**International Day of the Child**.) Subsequently dolls have been presented to MLAs, MPs, and the United Church General Council. These dolls represent the hope of ending the child poverty in all parts of Canada and the ultimately the world.

Western Ontario Waterways Region (WOW)

Seventy women registered and 12 more joined on line to attend the Western Ontario Waterways Region UCW on October 20, 2025. The hybrid event was hosted by Drayton UCC.

Our theme was "Then Let Us Sing!"

A 3-generational delegation of members from Pine River United Church, led by their minister, Rev. Wonder, went on a study tour to Zimbabwe in August. Four of them came and told us about their trip. The oldest traveller was 75 and the youngest 7 or 8. One of the teens on the trip said he learned church could be "very loud and very active". Dancing while singing in worship is vigorous. They attended a Women's Gathering of 13,000 Women of the Reformed Church of Zimbabwe. There everyone wanted selfies with them. They brought official greetings from the Women to us in Drayton.

The speakers talked of how life-changing this trip was for them. Rev. Wonder hopes that there might be a reciprocal trip from some of the people in Zimbabwe, and that we in our regional UCW might find ways to continue to support and learn from these women from the Reformed Church of Zimbabwe.

In the afternoon, Dan Van Winden, Music Director of Avondale UCC, Stratford, led us in singing hymns from the new hymnal supplement, "Then Let Us Sing!" We learned that one of the criteria for choices of hymns to include hymns that spoke to those who could not find themselves, their stories, and music in our other hymn books. There are many beautiful new words, some set to music new to us, and some set to familiar tunes. There are even some songs with no English words.

We were moved to tears by some of the songs. Our hearts danced with joy as sang a Spanish song.

Our offering of \$522.65 went to the NUCW project of *Healing with Horses: Healing Grief and Families Impacted by Substance Abuse*.

We also recognized the work of Rev. Kathy Douglas, Faith Formation Minister for Western Ontario Waterways, Antler River Watershed, and Horseshoe Falls who has supported our Regional UCW over these years. She is retiring from the position as of December 31. We shall miss her faithful presence at our meetings.

It was a wonderful day of faith stories, community, and singing great music.

Leduc UCW led a business meeting in which it was decided that St. Albert UCW will host the rally in 2026. A motion was made to have money raised from registration, the offering and the book exchange table (\$694 in total) sent to the children of Gaza through the national church.



Units were invited to share what they had been doing since we last met and the morning ended with a Memorial Service for 6 UC Women, led by St. Albert UCW.

After grace, led by Stony Plain UCW, we returned to the coffee area and shared our bag lunches at designated tables along with some lively conversation.

Later, Rev. Leigh Sinclair introduced the theme, "Women of the Church" by telling us we were the women of the church, women with a deep spirituality, all of us different. The Gifts of the Spirit may come to us naturally, but some have to be nurtured. She got us on our feet to stand where we thought our greatest gift was: faithfulness, patience, self-control, gentleness, kindness then challenged us to grow in new directions. She ended by telling us, we were like a basket full of these gifts, the basket an image called the women of the church.

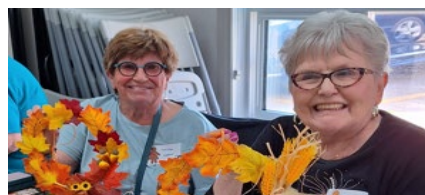

Celebrations of United Church Women Anniversaries

Celebrations of the United Church Women anniversaries started with the 25th Anniversary in 1987; the 35th Anniversary was celebrated 10 years later in 1997. It was decided to celebrate every 5 years from then on. To celebrate the occasion in 2012, a 50th anniversary project was adopted. It was to support the Morogoro Women's Training Centre in Tanzania. Over \$268,000 was raised, and as a result over 600 women were trained in maternity health care. In 2017, the United Church Women celebrated its 55th Anniversary, "Celebrating Spirit", in Vancouver, British Columbia.
