Indigenous Delegates Attend COP30

The United Church of Canada's two delegates with the Kairos delegation to COP30 were Samantha Miller, Community Youth Member, and Joni Shawana, Healing Programs Coordinator, both with Indigenous Ministries and Justice (IMJ). Taking place in Belém, Brazil, the conference was alongside Amazonia, a living symbol of both ecological crisis and resistance. COP30 provided an opportunity for youth, Indigenous Peoples and communities in the global south to come together and provide leadership on global climate change.

Samantha Miller (Haudenosaunee) is connected to the land and honours the land as her mother. She is a keeper of the language and feels a strong responsibility to listen to and protect her mother. Samantha attended COP30 in person.

Joni Shawana (Anishnaabe) has been rooted in nature and has had a connection with her first family—the land and water—since childhood. Joni coordinates healing programs, works with the climate advocacy team, and supports Indigenous justice work. Joni attended COP30 virtually.

Samantha and Joni joined the KAIROS delegation, which participated in both COP30 and the Peoples' Summit, for a time of community, advocacy, and learning.

Our Work Together in 2025

2025 brought a new set of pressures for communities around the world.

Economic uncertainty and rising costs of living have strained households and local systems alike, while growing social isolation and mental health challenges have deepened the need for connection and care. At the same time, many communities continue to navigate the ongoing impacts of displacement and migration, seeking safety, stability, and belonging. Here in Canada, these realities are being felt in very real ways, with more individuals and families turning to community supports than ever before.

In the face of these realities, your compassion has remained steadfast. Through Mission and Service, your gifts have continued to offer meaningful, timely support—meeting immediate needs while also strengthening longer-term resilience.

In 2025, Mission and Service partnered with organizations across the globe, supporting vital work in numerous countries and contexts. In Canada, each regional council received dedicated funding to resource local ministries, enabling responsive, community-based support where it is needed most. 87 percent of funds were spent in Canada, and 13 percent spent globally.

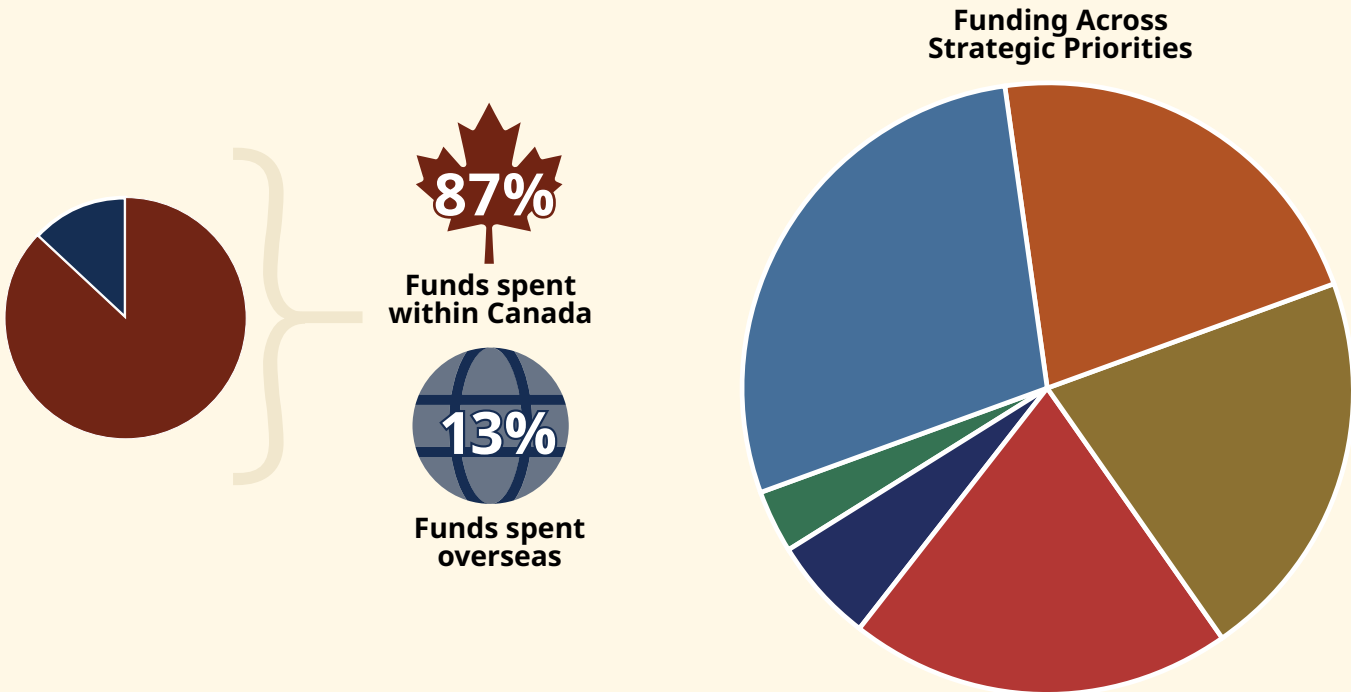


Journeying Indigenous Pathways: Forging Right Relations (2024: 23.0%)

(Re)Generate: Equipping Leaders for the Future

The bold statement “we will propose, develop, and create 100 new Communities of Faith” resonated with Rev. Tim Bowman, encouraging him to apply for the leadership school, (Re)Generate, led by the Very Rev. Carmen Lansdowne with strategic guest instructors. He was accepted along with other ministry colleagues.

The program involved six sessions, two online and four in person, over 18 months. The focus from the beginning was to be “real” with one another. Being “real” involved in-depth conversations, opening up, and learning that the incredible, intelligent, and passionate leaders participating all felt like they had much to learn from each other and needed each other’s support.

The participants also learned finance, fundraising, project management, personal time management and goal setting, systems thinking, how to lead teams and volunteers, how to give and receive feedback, and so much more.

The Very Rev. Dr. Carmen Lansdowne led throughout, modelling failing forward for participants and showing them how to bravely put forward new ideas. At the end, Rev. Bowman was left with the realization that the church is filled with amazing people, and we are all being called to Deep Spirituality, Bold Discipleship, and Daring Justice.

Words cannot fully describe what a privilege and an affirmation it is to be part of this (Re)Generate cohort. You are not alone. If you think you are, reach out.

Strengthening Invitation

This image commemorates Jesus' act of radical inclusion—sharing a meal with his followers, washing their feet and urging them to love one another. The church's reimagining invites reflection on its core value: that God's love for all is limitless.

Everyone, celebrating all backgrounds and identities, has a place at the table. A defining feature of this image is the absence of Christ in physical form.

Instead, Christ's presence is embodied through the gathered community, underscoring the belief that faith is expressed through justice, compassion, and service.

"This is not just a statement for all time, but for our time," said Rev. Michael Blair, General Secretary of The United Church of Canada.

"This reimagining calls us to rethink what

it means to be a faith community—one that evolves with the times, embraces diversity and actively fosters spaces of bold belonging. It's not enough to simply have a seat, one must have a voice and the space to bring the fullness of all

who gather."

This reimagining also underscores The United Church of Canada's ongoing commitment to advocacy, including support for 2S and LGBTQIA +

rights, Reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples, Racial Equity, Disability Justice, and engagement in struggles for peace and human rights, including those around the globe. It affirms that true belonging requires more than just tolerance, it requires action, dialogue and the intentional creation of spaces where all are truly welcomed and valued.
